FROM REV. BARBARA'S DESK

"What do you want for Christmas?" I asked my 12-year-old grandson recently. I could almost see him puzzling to come up with something. Last year it was skateboards and related things, but that fascination seems to have passed. The year before he was really into mushrooms, so books about them, and mushroom T-shirts, mushroom-growing kits and a series of classes at the local mycological society. But this year he seems between hobbies. He mentioned a few books, a new toy for his puppy. But really, he has what he needs, and it doesn't seem like he wants anything in particular. And this is the season for wanting: advertisers do their very best to create all sorts of 'wants'!

I thought about part of the discussion at last Saturday's 'Building Your Own Theology' class. Our topic was 'evil', but as is usually the case, our ruminations covered a broad range of topics. At one point, someone spoke about the difference between a 'want' and a 'need'. I need clothing, obviously: in this climate and culture, clothing really is a need. But yet another sweater to join the dozens already in my closet, just because I don't have one in exactly that color (well, OK, I do - but it's a summer-weight sweater and the one I'm eyeing is a heavier weight) - that sweater is a 'want'. I don't need it. I have plenty. And yet, it's almost painful to persuade myself I don't need it, to let it go unpurchased. It's like I'm shirking my duty to boost the economy with yet another purchase, not doing my part to support the clothing/fashion industry, depriving myself of something in that particular color in that certain fabric.

So what am I implicitly saying to my grandson, when my question makes him search for something - anything - that he can want me to get him for Christmas? Maybe he doesn't need to want anything! Maybe he really is content with what he has, and he's old enough so stacks of gifts aren't a measure of parental or grandparental love. So I ponder: what to get him? Christmas gift-giving is in my blood, almost a need. But what would actually have meaning to him and not just encourage pointless consumerism? What does he actually need?

I wound up buying him a few books, and warm wooly socks (both are traditions!) I ordered his favorite rhubarb candies online, but I finally decided to spend most of the money I allocated for his Christmas presents on what people actually need, in his name. I bought a flock of chicks through Heifer International in his name, and made a donation to a local gardening project he's talked about. I think he'll get it: he'll be part of meeting an actual need for some people this Christmas, rather than just amassing pointless things for himself. There's no reason he has to 'want' anything. And there's a lot to be said for his being content with all that he has, and a lot to be learned by helping him to focus on assisting those who have very little instead.

All of which makes me wonder: What do I want for Christmas? What do I want in life? What do I need? How can I remember the difference between 'want' and 'need' more readily - all sorts of very skilled marketing forces work very hard at getting me to conflate the two. Perhaps what I really do want is to become more aware of what I truly need, which is not another sweater at all. More awareness, and gratitude, and stronger generosity: that's what I need at this season.

May your holiday season be bright, and peaceful, and may you discover and even receive what you truly need!

UPDATE ON RENTING OUR RE SPACE

We are now working with a realtor to find a tenant for the RE space. After a long search we have signed a contract with Coldwell Banker Prime Properties' Dennis Brower, an experienced, licensed real estate broker. Dennis has been a broker for many years, previously being the Town of Queensbury's elected Supervisor. Dennis has worked with us to set a reasonable and attractive amount of rent for our space. He is optimistic that we will find a suitable tenant. He believes that our space would be a pleasant space for office types of uses. He will attempt to find one tenant for the entire space. Our space is listed in the multiple listing service so that it will be viewed by realty agents and the public.

Many thanks are due to the many volunteers who have helped ready this space for rental. The rugs are cleaned and in good condition. The walls have been repaired and painted. The Town of Queensbury has recently inspected and passed the space and the entire church building for fire safety. Some work is yet to be accomplished. A door for the current classroom needs to be installed in the hallway so access to this room will not be through the rental space. Also to be noted is that the rest

rooms will be shared with the tenants. It's possible that some relatively small storage space will be offered to the tenant depending on their need.

There are many unknowns involved in our new role as landlords. Because the utilities are not separate we will offer the rent to include the utilities and we don't know the cost of this, including we don't know the extent to which the newly installed solar panels will impact the expense of electricity. We will need to work with snow removal contracts to ensure the necessary access to the building on an expanded time schedule of building usage. We need to be involved in leases and other legal documents as well as collecting rent and managing other tenant issues. These are just a few examples of this road that lies ahead. Your understanding and assistance will be important as we navigate through our first experiences in this new endeavor. Please help us keep this rental space clear of unwanted items and clean so that it is available and appropriate to be shown to prospective tenants. There are currently more rental properties on the market than there are prospective tenants, so everything we can do to make the property attractive can be very important. Again, many thanks for the efforts you have already taken and will take to help with this effort. This rental effort is highly significant in contributing to the financial sustainability of UUCGF.
